1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Eastern Karbi Anglong College, a leading higher educational institution of the eastern part of the district of Karbi Anglong, was established in 1997 at Sarihajan at the unstinting initiative and generous contribution of the local public. The budding institution was initially housed at the old dispensary building of Karbi Anglong *Sewa Kendra* with the newly erected temporary house by the local public at Sarihajan *Tini Ali*. In 2001 the college was shifted to its permanent building set up at its permanent land (100 bighas) allotted by the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC), Diphu. The college was accorded establishment and academic permissions by the department of Education, Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC), Diphu with effect from the date of its establishment in 1997. Moreover, the institution obtained permission for classes upto undergraduate level from Assam University, Silchar, Assam in 1998. An affiliated college to Assam University, it was granted "Govt. Concurrence" on 18th October, 2001. Further, degree examination centre was granted in 2005 and since then the college has been conducting the degree final examinations in its own centre. More satisfyingly, the "Assam Venture Institutions Provincialisation (of services) Act, 2011, amended 2012" was enforced in the college w.e.f 1st January, 2013. The college got itself registered under UGC's 2(f) and 12(b) vide order: F No.8-498/2012 (CPP-I/C) dated 13th October, 2015. The college has so far recorded satisfactory academic performance besides excelling in various fields including games and sports and literary activities.

Vision

1. To impart quality education for rural and tribal students to meet new challenges of life and to make them good, self-reliant and capable citizens of the society and the nation.
2. To create excellent educational opportunities in line with the needs of the community and help students meet socio-economic and cultural/environmental challenges to become active participants in shaping the world of the future.

Mission

1. To enrich the society through academic advancement and instilling correct attitudes and values needed for the holistic development of each and every student.
2. To strive for the uplift of the students by creating an awareness among them for their socio-economic, political and educational status in the society.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The well-stocked central library with text books, reference books including few sets of encyclopedias, journals subscribed through the annual membership of NLIST, INFLIBNET lend us the much-needed boost to sustain as an institution of higher education.
- The green campus of the institution provides a serene ambiance which is conducive to academic as well

as intellectual pursuits.

- The neighbouring community has extended unstinting support and co-operation to the institution since its inception.
- The college has enormous scope for expansion of its campus in sufficient measure due to its possession of 100 bighas of land.
- Young and energetic, highly professional teaching faculty add vitality and dynamism to the teaching-learning aspect of the institution.
- Pure drinking water facility in the campus is ensured for one and all.

Institutional Weakness

- Majority of the students hail from illiterate and economically poorer background and that leads to higher drop-out rates of students of the institution.
- Prevalent “bundh culture” has sapped the vitality and dynamism of the institution.
- Lack of vocational/ skill-oriented courses/ programmes renders our students jobless and insecure.
- Due to lack of a Conference Hall, meetings, seminars etc. have to be adjusted in classrooms.
- Not accredited by NAAC, the institution is not in a position to apply for any funds other than the limited plan fund from the state government and KAAC, and this has adversely affected its infrastructural growth.
- Lack of sufficient smart/ digital classrooms renders the teaching-learning more traditional and outdated.
- The existing less energetic Alumni Association has miserably failed to contribute to the institution.

Institutional Opportunity

- Our institution has ample scope for establishing itself as an excellent seat of learning.
- We have better scope for opening of PG sections in both M.A. and M. Sc in near future.
- The institution looks forward to multifarious outreach activities/ community services to be carried out in the neighbouring villages/ schools.
- We have excellent scope for turning the institution as a research hub as it is situated in a hilly region which is a habitat of various medicinal plants, ginger being one of them.
- The existing mentor-mentee system has a scope to be upgraded/strengthened with better mechanism for addressing the problems of students more effectively.

Institutional Challenge

- Keeping pace with the fast changing technology poses a real challenge in view of our institution being located in a remote area.
- Mushrooming of private colleges in the vicinity can offer us a tough competition in near future in matters of attracting bright students from the neighbouring areas.
- Given the present infrastructural set-up, the gradual increase in enrolment of students can prove to be a tougher challenge for the institution. The implementation of CBCS system requiring more courses, more classrooms would definitely prove challenging in view of the existing infrastructure.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

In order to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum as prescribed by the affiliating university, the college prepares its academic calendar as well as class-routines prior to commencement of each academic session. The course structure/ syllabus of different programmes/ courses are specified/ detailed in the Prospectus and the same is also made available in the HEI website. With the help of the academic calendar the college chalks out tentative plan for both academic and non-academic activities before hand and tries to adhere to it. The college particularly sticks to the academic calendar for holding the internal examinations/sessional tests. The college offers courses such as **BA honours** in English, Economics, Political Science, Education, Sociology, Assamese, History, **B. A. general course**, **B. Sc honours** in Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology, **B. Sc. general course** in Physics, Mathematics, Chemistry, Zoology and Botany. A section of teachers of the college participate in academic activities related to curriculum development, and assessment of the affiliating university and have representation in BoS, and engaged in setting of question papers for the UG programmes. The institution follows the CBCS curriculum as implemented and enforced by its affiliating university in all its programmes. In the current academic year, i.e., 2020-21 the college has introduced three (03) certificate courses to supplement the existing curriculum. Moreover, the institution integrates cross-cutting issues like professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability into the curriculum by observing National days, World Environment Day, International Yoga Day etc. so that such values could be inculcated among its students. Awareness programmes are organised to give students the real feel and practical knowledge on the cross-cutting issues. Through the project works/ field works/ field trips or field studies of certain courses/papers students are provided experiential learning. Feedback process on the curriculum has been initiated by IQAC of the institution and necessary analysis and follow-up action thereof is accomplished.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College has a systematic and well-organised teaching-learning and evaluation system. Student enrollment of the institution is quite encouraging. The location of the college being in a tribal hilly area, majority of the students who get admitted here belong to the reserved category. In fact, the process of admission is governed by the reservation policy of the state government of Assam. The institution assesses the learning level of students on the basis of slow, average and advanced learners. Slow learners are given special care and attention by the teachers while advanced learners are singled out to give them projects and assignments. Experiential learning like field visit, project work, participative learning like class quiz, group discussion, and problem solving methodologies like case study are adopted to ensure optimum learning outcome. ICT-based teaching learning tools such as Google classroom, whatsapp group, youtube audio/video class etc are employed to supplement the class room learning. The teacher profile of our institution is quite good with 9 teachers having the Ph. D. degree and majority of the teachers having good teaching experience in the same institution. The students are evaluated on the basis of their performance in the internal examinations, attendance, and end-semester examinations. The college has a transparent mechanism to deal with exam-related grievances. The teachers and the students are well aware of the stated programme and course outcomes as COS for all the programmes and courses are uploaded in the HEI website for general information. To evaluate the attainment of outcomes, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are organised in the college. Average pass percentage of final year students during the last five years is not satisfactory.

Research, Innovations and Extension

In matters of getting research grants and projects the college is lagging far behind. However, in the extension

front, the institution has conducted atleast thirteen seminars/ workshops during the assessment period. The teachers of the college have published a few research papers in the journals notified on the UGC website. A few numbers of books and chapters have been published in edited volumes and some papers have also been published in national/ international conference proceedings during the last five years. The college has carried out a good number of extension and outreach programmes at the initiative of NSS, women cell, health and hygiene cell, science forum etc. The participation of the students in such programmes and activities is quite encouraging. Further, the college has a few collaborations/ linkages for the faculty and the student exchange, field trips in addition to a few functional MoUs with national institutions during the assessment period.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is located in a beautiful green campus measuring 1,33,780.3776 Sq. meter with total constructed land of 20415.6288 Sq. meter. With this large constructed area, the institute takes the pride of having 14 classrooms including 2 smart classrooms, 3 science laboratories and a spacious library of 213.932 Sq. meters with reading room facility. The library is partially automated with Integrated Library Management System SOUL2.0 provided by INFLIBNET and has the annual membership of N-LIST, INFLIBNET. Large playground of the institute measuring 200/150 meter with total play area of 80/100 meter, facilitates the physical activities of the students. The college canteen caters the need of both students and staff as it provides light refreshment. A power generator helps to provide uninterrupted power supply. To provide the alternate source of energy, the institute has installed four solar panels in the campus. To fulfill the increasing needs of the students, the institute furnishes 12 computers for students and free Wi-Fi facility in the campus. Moreover, it has two broadband internet connection having bandwidth 100 Mbps. Whole campus of the institute is under CCTV surveillance. Rainwater harvesting system developed by the institute is properly maintained to conserve water. The institute takes the step to promote clean and green campus by encouraging students to plant tree, and by maintaining a beautiful garden having various kinds of floras, inside the campus.

Student Support and Progression

The student support and progression of the college is average. 85.8 percentage of students have benefitted by scholarships provided by the government during the last five years. Yoga and ICT skills programmes have been organised for enhancement of skills and for capacity building of our students. 5.82 percentage of the students have benefitted by guidance for competitive examinations and career counselling programmes organised by the institution. The college has a transparent mechanism of submission of online/ offline grievances of the students for timely redressal of the grievances submitted by the students through the relevant committees. The placement of outgoing students and progression to higher education of our students cannot be regarded satisfactory. Some few outgoing students of the college have appeared in the state/ national level examination and qualified in the same. The college has an elected Students' Union Society and the office-bearers/ secretaries take part in various administrative, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the institution. Again, the students of the college have active representation in committees such as Anti-ragging, Anti-sexual harassment etc. A few students have participated in sports and cultural events during the assessment period.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision statement is well manifested in all the institutional activities. The college has adopted the policy of

decentralisation and participative management. The participative management is apparent in the functioning of various committees of the college. The institutional strategic plan is effectively deployed at the initiatives of IQAC. Teaching learning plan, Research and Development plan are meticulously chalked out by the authority of the college. The college administration has initiated effective welfare measures for the teaching and non-teaching staff by encouraging the teaching staff to undertake research works. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in OP, RC, FDP, seminars and workshops for faculty development. Teachers of the college are provided with financial help to attend training programmes. The institution has organised a few training programmes for the teaching staff. 25.86 percentage of teachers have undergone FDP programmes during the assessment period. Our college follows performance appraisal system where the teachers submit their self appraisal along with supporting documents to IQAC. The audit of the college is done in two layers such as Internal Audit and External Audit. The institution mobilizes its funds received from the state government and UGC. IQAC of the college has worked for evolving quality assurance strategies for bringing quality in teaching and research, for organising seminars, workshops etc., for initiating feedback mechanism for the stakeholders of the institution. The IQAC meetings have been held on regular interval.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has adopted some measures for promotion of gender equity among the students and staff of the institution. Through the initiatives the institution ensures that no gender discrimination could take place. The college has taken up safety and security measures for the girl students. Representation of boys and girls is ensured in different committees of the institution. The college has installed solar lights and used LED bulbs in the college campus as well as in the class rooms as part of energy conservation measures. The institution has facilities for management of solid waste. The college has water conservation facilities like rain water harvesting, borewell, and constructed tanks. The green campus initiatives taken up by the institution is quite up-to-the-mark. The college has restricted entry of automobiles in the campus, made room for pedestrian-friendly pathways, banned use of plastic, and done landscaping with trees and plants. A disabled-friendly, barrier free environment is ensured by the college by making provision for ramps for easy access to classrooms, and providing disabled-friendly washrooms. The institution has always tried to provide an inclusive environment for its students and staff members. This inclusive practice is evident in different activities taken up by the institution. Our college has never compromised with the idea of sensitization of the students and employees towards the constitutional obligations. The college has prescribed specific code of conduct for the teachers as well as students. The National and international commemorative days, events have been celebrated by the institution with a view to developing among the students qualities like creativity and togetherness. The college has implemented two best practices, one being on 'Best Reader award' while the other being on automation of the college library. The college bears its uniqueness by showing its commitment to the tribal rural folk of the locality who have always craved for quality education at their door steps.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>The institution has a clear vision to transform itself into a holistic multidisciplinary institution as guided by the affiliating university i.e. Assam University, Silchar. The institution has been already following CBCS system under Assam University, Silchar. Along with the CBCS curriculum the institution is planning to conduct some project works on community-based Education, Environmental Education, Value-based Education to impart knowledge about the said issues. As per plan for following a multidisciplinary flexible curriculum, the institution is ready to go forward in accordance with University guideline. In the context of multidisciplinary/ interdisciplinary curriculum no such remarkable efforts have been initiated so far. However, we have a clear vision to initiate some projects on Integrated Farming, Green Agricultural practices harnessing with the department of Biology, Chemistry exploiting the resources of cultivable soil. It is worth mentioning that we have plenty of rich soil and there is enormous possibility to undertake a handful of projects on Medicinal plant gardening, Mushroom farming, Honey Bee cultivation etc. The practical aspects of 'Green Chemistry' may well be applied in those projects so far as the interest of the students goes. Besides, Karbi Anglong is the hotspot of Bio-diversity as well as ethnic diversity. So, short-term courses on Ecotourism can be introduced in near future. The institution has a plan to constitute a research committee to engage itself in more multidisciplinary research initiatives to find solutions to the challenging and pressing issues of the society.</p>
<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>As far as academic bank of credits is concerned our institution is ready to implement the initiatives taken up by the concerned implementing authority. The institution has not yet been registered under ABC. The institution is yet to avail such opportunities. However, the institution is appreciative of such a framework offered by NEP. Faculties of the institution are in constant touch of the Affiliating University regarding curriculum development, assessment and evaluation process etc. It may be noted that some departments prepare course module, syllabus for short-term certificate courses. As for instance, we have prepared syllabus and course module for 'Spoken English' and 'Art and Craft' courses.</p>

3. Skill development:	<p>The institution has already started skill based education for the students by introducing some certificate courses. Moreover, the institution has a clear vision to introduce more vocational courses with the help of “National Skills Qualification Framework” and the affiliating university. We have plan to offer short term certificate courses on Vocational Education with prior approval of the affiliating university. The institution has a clear vision on value based education. In this regard, a number of yoga programmes have been organized and we are planning to set up a permanent platform of such practices. Besides, we are desirous to introduce a course on “Life Skill” as part of our holistic approach to education. Pertaining to the skill development, the institution has been offering a training course on ‘Art and Craft’ especially engaging the interest of the girl students. Moreover, an exhibition in local level has been arranged for highlighting the talents of the students.</p>
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	<p>As an affiliated college to Assam University, Silchar we have a syllabus enriched with Ancient/Classical and Modern topics proposed by the university experts. It is worth mentioning that the syllabus encompasses the knowledge system of Indian socio-cultural heritage, its prospects and visions synchronizing modern aspects of Western Education. Therefore, a separate strategy is needless to be worked out by the college in this regard. In the context of bilingual aspects of teaching we have been using English as Medium of Instruction. It is worth mentioning that our student community is comprised of different tribes and caste having their own dialects. In such a multilingual milieu we have no alternative but to follow English as a primary mode of communication. However, the Assamese language is also used frequently as a means of translation. Some teachers use the Hindi language to explain the topics of discussion.</p>
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	<p>Outcome based education (OBE) is directly related to the pragmatic and careeristic aspects of modern education. In the context of the subjects of humanities, the concept of OBE is somewhat indirect, because it aims at a holistic understanding of the myriads of issues of life and expansion of a better consciousness for human resources development. However, a good number of students graduating from</p>

	<p>our institution have proved themselves competent in procuring jobs in different sectors. In the context of science stream, the concept of outcome based education is obviously pertinent. The main objective of the science education is to create competent students, technocrats, physicists, environmentalists, physicians, biologists etc. Along with the main subjects various domains of applied fields are encouraged by science education. Our science stream has been performing its best to contribute to this end encompassing Practical, Fundamental and Reflective aspects of education.</p>
6. Distance education/online education:	<p>The institution envisions to offer vocational courses through ODL and online mode. Technology enabled learning has become increasingly important in current educational environment. As an affiliated institution, there is only little scope for providing distance/online education. It is to be highlighted that the institution has already digitalized the library service. Following the vestiges of digitalization the institution has been trying to transform the conventional classroom to digitized platform. Presently, we have two digital classrooms. It is remarkable that during COVID-19 Pandemic, the institution successfully imparted online education and conducted internal examinations assigned by the University. Moreover, the institution has a study centre of KKHSOU to provide distance mode of learning to the degree aspirants.</p>

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

In order to assess the learning levels of the students admitted to our institution, the teachers make efforts to find out the potentialities and the competency of the students and attempt to initiate specific approaches with respect to slow, average, and advanced learners. The teachers give special attention to these three groups with reference to their course materials given to them. Slow learners are given extra classes / remedial classes so that they can understand the subjects without hesitating. Different types of methods are taken up to involve the students in the teaching –learning process. The faculty members of respective departments identify the advance learners on the basis of their performance in class tests, sessional examinations (in-semesters), interaction etc. The stratified groups are then allotted advance topics, assignments. They are also assigned to solve the university question papers of at least last 5-7 years examinations. The faculty members, then, discuss the question papers in extra classes. The shortcomings are pointed out. The students are also provided lists of reference books available in the departmental as well as the central library for furthering of their knowledge level.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The college maintains full transparency in internal assessment and adopts specific procedures to enhance the quality of such assessment. The evaluation blue-print has normally been ear-marked by the university through the syllabus and course structure. 70% marks of each paper is at the disposal of the university and set in the end semester examination. The other 30% is allotted to the sessional part. This 30 marks come from 20 marks of 1st and 2nd sessional, and the remaining 10 marks from the attendance of the students in the class. Students showing a record of 75% and more are only eligible for the weightage given for attendance. The important points of internal assessment are given below:

*The evaluation guidelines as prescribed by the affiliating university is published in the college prospectus.

*Home assignments are given to students from time to time.

* Sessional tests are held on the topics taught in line with the schedule specified in the Academic Calendar of Assam University.

* Attendance of students is strictly maintained by properly marking in the class registers and proper weightage of attendance in internal assessment is ensured by submitting the attendance record in the university online portal.

* Marks of sessional tests are displayed on the Notice board and answer scripts are shown to the students if asked for.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

Our institution has always tried to evolve specific mechanism to deal with grievances that might arise out of the system of internal examination. We have examination committee and grievance redressal committee to look after such issues and the administration in consultation with the afore-said committees makes sure

that the exam-related grievances are dealt with in a transparent and efficient manner.

The university frames all the rules and regulations regarding the evaluation process in the meeting of “Board of Studies” and “Academic Council” and circulate the resolutions to all the affiliating colleges. The principal also provides the copies of resolutions to the HODs and ensures that all the faculty members are aware of the evaluation process. The principal with the help of IQAC convenes general meeting of the faculty members and appraises them of the evaluation processes through discussion. Consequently, the faculty members communicate the same to the students in their respective classes. The students can also avail the RTI act in case of any examination related grievances with the help of the principal and the RTI cell of the college.

In case of internal assessment students are given full freedom to enquire about their marks if they are not satisfied with their marks. Moreover, answer scripts of the sessional examinations are shown to the students so that they will be aware of their mistakes and score better marks in future.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

Classrooms

The institute has sufficient number of well-furnished classrooms to fulfill the needs of teaching-learning process for both Arts and Science stream. Fans, lights and proper ventilations are available in all the classrooms. Most of the classrooms are equipped with white board and a few of the classrooms have traditional black boards. In addition to that two ICT enabled classrooms have been provided to make the teaching-learning process more effectual.

Laboratories

Institute provides three temporary laboratories of Biology (Zoology and Botany), Chemistry and Physics for newly introduced Science stream. The permanent building for four laboratories of science stream is under construction. All the laboratories are equipped with necessary apparatus. Practical classes for education are done in any of the classrooms with the help of equipments provided by the institution.

Library facility

The institute has a central library with a good collection of books, current periodicals and bound periodicals. Facilities for in-house reading both for teachers and students are provided in a separate reading corner. It has free Wi-Fi facilities. Users can access to e-resources of N-LIST, INFLIBNET through the institutional membership. Four computers for internet browsing and accessing e-resources and a printer for students are available. Photocopying facility is provided both for teachers and students inside the library.

Computer laboratory

The institute has a computer laboratory with eight computers. Students use the laboratory for practical purposes.

Other supporting facilities

The institute has following other supporting facilities.

*Canteen: College canteen with separate rooms for teachers and students caters the need for refreshment during leisure time with tea, snacks etc. Also provides lunch occasionally.

* Three phase electricity connection.

* A 20KV power generator for uninterrupted power supply during electricity failure.

- * Three xerox machines to provide photocopying facility for both teachers and students.
- * Adequate number of close circuit cameras for monitoring the classrooms and campus activities.
- * Safe drinking water.
- * Six fire extinguishers.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Response:

Eastern Karbi Anglong College Library is partially automated by using an Integrated Library Management System called SOUL2.0 developed by INFLIBNET, Ahmedabad. With a vision of automating the library, the college placed an order to INFLIBNET for purchasing SOUL2.0 with an advance payment of Rs.80,000/- by Demand Draft on January, 2015. INFLIBNET took a long time to process our order and finally in December 2015, we were able to install the ILMS in one desktop computer of the library. Accordingly in 2016, library automation was started. Data entry for the books through the cataloguing module of this software is going on. Issue and return of books through the circulation module of SOUL2.0 has recently been started. In order to make the circulation system fully automated, the library has taken a step to introduce bar code technology. A software has been purchased in December, 2021 for applying this technology. Printing of bar code labels for accession number of books by using the recently purchased software LabelPrintX ver1.0 is under process.

- Maintenance in general and maintenance for infrastructure is carried out under the supervision of the college authority.
- The college authority takes help from technical experts from time to time for regular check-up, repairing and maintenance of different physical and academic support facilities such as computers, CCTV camera, electrical equipments etc.
- The authority also consults with service providers from time to time to keep the internet connection and Wi-Fi facility up-to-date.
- Departmental requirements are placed to the authority by the respective Heads of the Departments and action at the level of college authority is initiated accordingly.
- Repair and maintenance of laboratory equipments are initiated by the respective departments and the college authority is intimidated accordingly. Stock register for the apparatus of each laboratory is maintained by the respective departments.
- A library committee is formed for looking after proper maintenance and utilization of library facilities.
- An accession register of standard format is maintained for library books. Library books are properly accessioned, classified and catalogued. Books are issued to the students for 15 days and can be renewed, if required.
- An Integrated Library Management System SOUL2.0 provided by INFLIBNET, is used for cataloguing and circulating library books. Librarian contacts with Soul support, in matters of any problem thereof. Anti-virus software is purchased and renewed annually to keep the software secured.
- The maintenance and house-keeping of the classrooms, laboratories, library and the institute as a whole are taken care by fourth grade staff of the institute.
- The power generator of the institute is serviced annually.
- A Comprehensive Annual Maintenance Contract with InfraTrade Solutions of Paltan Bazaar, Guwahati for ‘CCTV, its accessories and Wi-Fi system setup’, ensures proper maintenance and renewal of ‘CCTV and Wi-Fi system of the college.
- Four solar panels have been installed as a source of alternate energy.
- The college playground is properly maintained under the supervision of college authority.
- Fire-extinguishers are installed to counter situations like fire hazard.

Response:

The College is quite sensitive to latest management concept like decentralization, team work, decision making, participative management etc. So, it has adopted the policy of decentralization and the same is ensured through participatory management of the institution. Every faculty is a member of two or more committees in the college. The Principal with the support of HoDs, conveners of committees initiates the decision making process which creates an organizational climate of participatory democracy. Teachers' engagement in the overall functioning of the college through the staff council is enumerated below.

- The committees such as IQAC, Academic Advisory Board, Anti-Ragging committee, Examination Committee, Disciplinary Action Committee, College Development Committee, Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee, Campus Cleanliness and Beautification Committee, Outreach Activities and Public Relation committee etc. The College encourages a culture of participative management.
- The Governing Body is the highest decision making authority with the principal as the Secretary. The GB also includes two teaching staff representatives and one non-teaching staff representative to look into the overall policy and governance of the institution.
- The principal permits the HODs and staff members in performing freely in the academic activities and administrative programmes such as departmental activities, allotment of workload, various academic committee programmes, conducting departmental tests, teaching and learning process and evaluation regularly.

The organogram of Eastern Karbi Anglong college reflects the democratic character and shared responsibilities with which governance takes place. While the Governing Body is the immediate apex authority of the institution the president of the GB is nominated by the D.H.E Govt. of Assam. Two members are nominated by the V.C of the affiliating university, namely Assam University. There are two teacher representatives in the GB elected / nominated from among the teachers of the college. Besides, there is a representation of one non-teaching staff. The librarian of the college is special invitee to the GB. The local MLA is also an invited member to the GB. There are three guardian members in the GB. The principal functions as the secretary of it. The vice-principal remains as an ex-officio member in the G.B.

- The administration and execution of every day functions lies in the charge of the principal. The functions of the principal in turn are supported by the teaching faculty and the non-teaching staff. The IQAC of the college plays a key role in ensuring a quality teaching and learning environment in the college.
- For the smooth conduct of academic administrative and other activities the college authority has constituted different committees and cells.
- The services of the employees are regulated as per provincialisation of college employees Act and college services conduct rule.
- All fresh recruitments are made in a transparent manner by giving public advertisement in widely circulated dailies of the state as well as in the college website as per the guidelines framed by the Govt. of Assam and UGC from time to time.
- The service rules, recruitment and promotional policies are followed in accordance with the regulations of the UGC as well as the state government.
- The various bodies of the institution such as Students Union Society work in cooperation for upliftment of the institution.
- The college has an admission committee consisting of the Principal, the Vice-Principal, and all teaching and non teaching staff. The committee looks after the admission procedures of the institution in accordance with the rules of the state government.
- The library organization in the college includes librarian, library Asstt. and clerk. They smoothly run the college library. The librarian also works with the library committee in upgrading the academic resources and function in the library.
- The college has constituted the Anti-ragging cell, Grievance redressal committee, Anti-sexual harassment cell for safe security of the students.
- The college has also a women cell for looking after women related issues.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Eastern Karbi Anglong College mobilizes its funds received mainly from the state government, Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council and from UGC on various heads of expenditures of the college. Funds received from the state government and Karbi Anglong District Council are spent on payment of salary for the faculty members.

The college also mobilizes its resource from the measly funds generated from self financing and integrated courses run by the college and by the security money from the college canteen.

Sources of funds of the college:

- 2.Salary grant: Salary grants received mainly from the state government and Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council for teaching and non-teaching staff.

5. Funds collected from college canteen, K.K. Handiqui State Open University.

3. The principal, G.B. and development committee with the help of account department ensures that the expenditure lies within the allotted budget.

Rules are so framed that girl students of the college can have equal representation in the students' union society election along with the boys. In different cells or committees of the college, participation of student members from both girl students and boy students is ensured. Similarly, the cells are also represented by both male and female teachers. There are specific committees like grievance redressal committee to address issues related to women. The women cell of the college has been actively looking after women issues and are engaged in activities like awareness programmes on Digital Banking, women hygiene programme as part of International women day, online solo patriotic song competition and online quiz competition during Covid-19 pandemic.

The women staff and girl students of the college do not feel unsafe and insecure in the college campus as there are solar lights in specific points and the campus is surrounded by strong boundary wall. Further, the head of institution monitors through CCTV panel the activities that could take place inside the college campus.

The college has separate hygienic toilets for both boys and girls. The teaching and non-teaching staffs have separate toilets for male and female. For the girl students the college has made provision for Girls' common room for safeguarding their privacy and convenience. The girl students have at their disposal incinerator and sanitary napkin vending machine.

It must be admitted that our institution does not have adequate facilities for management of degradable and non-degradable waste. However, within its limitation the college has devised ways for management of wastes in the college campus.

Solid Waste Management: Our institution has a provision for burying bio-degradable solid wastes like waste papers, dry leaves etc in a composing pit. The non-degradable wastes like plastic bottles, plastic bags, takeaway coffee cups, plastic straws etc are collected in the 'use-me bins' installed in common locations across the college campus which are finally accumulated for disposal. For the disposal of used sanitary napkins an incinerator is in the girls' common room.

Liquid Waste Management: There is little chance of spilling of liquid substances in the college campus. Whatever little spillage of oil we might have, the same is disposed properly in unused land belonging to the college. As regards pouring of water due to leakage of water pipe or overflow, it is left for ground water recharging.

Bio-medical Waste Management: The institution does not produce bio-medical waste except when health camps are organised in the college premises. In such cases, the wastes are collected and handed over to the medical staff for necessary disposal.

E-waste Management: Our institution sells out or replaces the old/ repairable electrical items like battery, tube, computer monitor, switch-board etc. As such, there is no e-waste in the college campus.

Title of the Practice: ‘Best Reader Award’ conferred by Eastern Karbi Anglong College Library.

Objective of the Practice: The practice of offering ‘Best Reader Award’ has been implemented with the following objectives.

- To motivate the students to use the library regularly.
- To develop reading habit among the students.
- To encourage the students to utilize the library resources efficiently.
- To promote maximum use of library resources and facilities.

The Context: As the college is located in rural area and a good number of students studying here come from remote areas of Karbi Anglong district, making them aware about the knowledge resources is the utmost responsibility of the library. Hence, to make the students of the remote rural area efficient and knowledgeable, the college library started this best practice in 2017. Library is an integral part of an institution, which foster a deep inbuilt desire in students to do extra reading besides text books. A library can’t be called a library in true sense, if its resources are not used efficiently. Keeping in view the first law of library science ‘Books are for Use’, the library of our institution started this practice to get optimum utilization of its resources.

The Practice: Best Reader Award is given away to one or maximum two students every year, selected on the basis of some criteria such as, attendance in library attendance register, number of books issued, timely return of the book, proper use of library resources, time spent in reading inside the library and behavior in the library. Generally, it is declared by the librarian in annual freshers’ social meet and is conferred by the principal of the college. For the session 2016-17 and 2017-18, a set of books was given as Best Reader Award. In 2018-19, a certificate was added with books and in 2019-20 and 2020-21, a cheque of Rs.2500/-, a certificate and a dictionary were given as Best Reader Award. Till the date, 7 students have achieved this award, as for the session 2017-18 and 2020-21, two students were selected for the award.

Evidence of Success: The practice can claim the success with evidences observed over the period. It can be mentioned that the practice has helped in increasing the daily reader of the library. It is observed that students have been motivated for maximum use of library resources and facilities and gradually reading habit among the students have also been developed. The student awarded as the Best Reader for the first time for the session 2016-17, completed Master Degree in Sociology from IGNOU and has started the job as subject teacher in Pranab Jubilee Senior Secondary School located in Sukhanjan of Bokajan sub-division, Karbi Anglong district. The awardees for the session 2018-19 and 2019-20, have completed their graduation recently with CGPA 7.50 and 6.63 and with letter grade A+ and A respectively.

Problems encountered and resources required: It is not so easy and problem free to select only one student as best reader. It has always to be kept in mind that other students will not be deprived through the process.

BEST PRACTICE-II

Title of the Practice: Automation of Eastern Karbi Anglong College Library with Integrated Library Management System Soul 2.0.

Objective of the practice: The college library has decided to initiate the automation process in view of the following objectives.

- To have a better access to the collection.
- To maintain bibliographical records of the collection.
- To save the time of user.
- To make library management works easy and faster.

The Context: Library automation is the process of computerization of day-to-day house-keeping works of the library such as acquisition, cataloguing, circulation and serial control. Application of library software in day-to-day house-keeping activities of the library, saves the time of the users and library professionals also and at the same time makes the library service smooth and effective. Considering all these factors in the context of changing scenario of academic library, Eastern Karbi Anglong College Library started the process of library automation in 2016. As Dr. S. R. Ranganathan says “Save the time of the user” in his fourth law of library science, the process of library automation may be a mere obligation of this law.

The Practice: The college library purchased an Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) SOUL2.0 provided by INFLIBNET against the advanced payment of Rs.80,000/- by Demand Draft on January, 2015. INFLIBNET took a long time to process our order and finally in December 2015, we were able to install the ILMS in one desktop computer of the library. Cataloguing of books through the cataloguing module of this software is going on. Issue and return of books through the circulation module of SOUL2.0 has recently been started. Another software namely LabelPrintX (Ver.1.0) has been purchased in December 2021 to introduce bar code technology. Printing of bar code labels for accession number of books by using the recently purchased software is under process.

Evidence of Success: The practice can claim the success as it ensures the easy and faster cataloguing of books. It can also be mentioned that it assures accuracy in circulation of books with greater speed. Above all, OPAC of SOUL 2.0 improves access system to the library collection.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Although library automation makes the day-to-day library house-keeping activities easy and faster, technical problems are always there. Due to such problems, automation can be done only for cataloguing and circulation. Automation of acquisition and serial control has not yet been done.
